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Should I paint my Calgary garage interior walls or leave them bare drywall?

How much should I budget for painting the interior of a new infill home in Killarney?

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What's the best way to paint around Calgary's forced-air heating vents without getting drips?

Remove the vent covers and paint them separately — this is the cleanest, most professional approach that eliminates drip issues entirely. Unscrew the registers from the wall or ceiling, clean them thoroughly, and spray or brush them in your garage or basement where you can control drips and achieve an even finish.

How do I prep textured ceilings for repainting in my older Brentwood bungalow?

Textured ceilings in Calgary's older neighborhoods like Brentwood require careful preparation because the original texture was often applied over multiple paint layers that have become brittle from decades of chinook temperature cycling and low winter humidity. Start by testing a small area with gentle scraping to see if the texture is loose or well-adhered, and always test for asbestos in pre-1980 homes before disturbing any ceiling materials.

The most critical first step is **asbestos testing** if your Brentwood bungalow was built before 1980. Many textured ceiling compounds from that era contained asbestos, and disturbing them without proper precautions creates serious health risks. Contact a certified asbestos testing company in Calgary for sampling before any prep work. If asbestos is present, hire a certified abatement contractor rather than attempting DIY removal.

Assuming your ceiling tests negative for asbestos, begin prep by protecting everything below with plastic sheeting and drop cloths. **Calgary's dry climate makes old paint and texture particularly dusty when disturbed.** Use a shop vacuum with brush attachment to remove loose debris, cobwebs, and dust from the textured surface. Clean the entire ceiling with a solution of warm water and TSP substitute to remove cooking grease, nicotine residue, and general grime that accumulates over decades. **Calgary's low humidity means this cleaning solution will dry quickly**, but ensure adequate ventilation when using cleaning chemicals indoors.

For the **primer coat**, use a high-quality latex primer designed for textured surfaces. Benjamin Moore Fresh Start or Sherwin-Williams ProBlock work well on Calgary ceilings. Apply with a thick-nap roller (3/4" to 1") to ensure the primer penetrates all the texture valleys. Back-roll immediately with a dry roller to smooth the finish and prevent stippling.

Choose your finish paint carefully for Calgary conditions. Flat latex paint is traditional for ceilings and hides imperfections well, but consider eggshell finish in kitchens and bathrooms where moisture and cooking residue require easier cleaning.
