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What's the average cost to paint a Calgary attached garage interior walls and ceiling?

Painting a two-storey stairwell in Calgary typically costs **\$800-2,500** depending on the height, complexity of angles, and finish quality required. This means scaffolding or specialized ladder systems — not extension ladders leaned against walls. Always verify your painter carries active WCB coverage, as stairwell work presents significant injury risk.

For DIY consideration, homeowners can handle stairwell painting if they have proper equipment and experience with tall walls. You'll need an articulating ladder (rent for \$50-80/day in Calgary) or scaffolding system, high-quality angled brushes for cutting around trim, and paint extenders to manage Calgary's dry air. However, the safety risks, equipment costs, and time investment often make professional painting the better choice.

Key Cost Factors

Height and access complexity account for 40-50% of stairwell painting costs. Standard 16-foot heights with straight walls cost less than curved staircases or cathedral ceilings with multiple angles. **Surface preparation** can double costs if extensive patching, priming, or texture repair is needed. **Paint quality** matters significantly in high-traffic stairwells — premium paints like **Benjamin Moore Advance** or **Sherwin-Williams ProClassic** cost more upfront but resist scuffing and maintain appearance longer.

What's the cost to paint a Calgary townhouse exterior when it's part of an HOA bulk project?

HOA bulk exterior painting projects in Calgary typically cost 15-25% less than individual townhouse painting, with homeowners paying \$3,500-\$7,500 per unit depending on the size of the complex, number of units painted simultaneously, and scope of work included.

The cost savings come from economies of scale that benefit both the HOA and individual homeowners. When painting 20-50 townhouse units in a single project, contractors can negotiate better paint pricing, reduce mobilization costs, and work more efficiently by moving equipment and crews systematically through the complex.

Calgary HOA painting projects typically run from late May through early September to work around chinook weather patterns, with contractors often completing 2-4 units per day once the project rhythm is established.

What's the average cost to paint all the doors and trim in a Calgary home?

Painting all doors and trim in a Calgary home typically costs \$2,500-\$6,000 for a standard 1,500-2,000 square foot house, depending on the number of doors, amount of trim detail, paint quality, and whether you choose brush-and-roll or spray application. Most Calgary homes have 8-12 interior doors plus baseboards, window casings, and door frames throughout.

Premium brands like Benjamin Moore Advance, Sherwin-Williams ProClassic, or Dulux Diamond provide the hardness needed for doors and trim. Expect to pay \$60-80 per

gallon for quality trim paint at Calgary retailers. Most jobs require 2-3 gallons depending on the home size and number of coats.

Preparation significantly affects pricing in Calgary homes. **Older homes built before 1990** often need extensive sanding, caulking, and priming, especially where wood trim has dried and shrunk in Calgary's arid climate. Homes with stained trim being converted to paint require thorough sanding and a high-quality primer like Zinsser Cover Stain or Benjamin Moore Fresh Start to prevent bleed-through. This prep work can add \$500-\$1,500 to the total cost.

How much do Calgary painters charge to colour match and touch up scuffed walls?

Calgary painters typically charge \$150-400 for basic colour matching and touch-up work, with most jobs falling in the \$200-300 range for a few scuffed areas in one or two rooms. The wide price range depends on the age of the existing paint, number of locations needing touch-up, and whether the original paint colour information is available.

Colour matching is the biggest variable in touch-up costs. If you have the original paint can with colour information or paint chips, matching is straightforward and painters can usually get an exact match at Sherwin-Williams, Benjamin Moore, or Home Depot for \$50-80 per gallon. However, if the paint has been on the walls for more than two years in Calgary's intense UV environment, even a perfect colour match may not blend seamlessly because the existing paint has likely faded. South-facing and west-facing walls in Calgary homes fade significantly faster than in other Canadian cities due to our elevation and UV exposure.

When original colour information isn't available, painters use spectrophotometer colour matching, available at most Calgary paint retailers. This process costs \$15-25 per colour but isn't foolproof on faded paint. Many painters include one colour match attempt in their base price, then charge \$50-100 additional if multiple matching attempts are needed. **The dry Calgary climate also affects how touch-up paint dries and blends** — low humidity can cause visible texture differences between new and old paint, especially with flat and eggshell finishes.

Touch-up work itself is priced as a service call plus time. Most Calgary painters have a minimum charge of \$150-200 just to show up, then charge \$40-60 per hour for the actual work. Simple scuff touch-ups take 1-2 hours including prep and cleanup. More extensive touch-up work — multiple rooms, ceiling repairs, or areas requiring primer — can run 3-5 hours total.

Alberta's low winter humidity creates additional challenges for interior touch-up work. Professional painters often add paint conditioner (like Floetrol) to help the new paint blend better with existing surfaces, and may recommend using a small roller rather than a brush to better match the original texture. **Premium paints with better flow and leveling properties** — like Benjamin Moore Regal Select or Sherwin-Williams ProClassic — blend more successfully than builder-grade paints, though they cost \$60-80 per gallon versus \$35-50 for basic latex.

DIY touch-up is certainly possible for handy homeowners. Take a paint chip to any Calgary paint retailer for colour matching, buy a quart (\$15-25), and use a small roller for better texture matching than a brush provides.
